



Numerous Internet articles, as well as, many books written on the topic of nontraditional education but few have focused on the opportunity to utilize these methods to obtain a professional law degree. Frankly having a law degree opens the door to career opportunities in a wide variety of fields. * Lawyers are in demand in management, banking, finance, sales, import-export, communications and, of course, teaching.

The below example of taking freely available information and turning it into a business: For example, after helping about a dozen ministry organizations qualify for nonprofit status as defined by IRC 501 (c) (3),

- Step 1: Start Business - Education Based Consultants of America LLC
- Steps 2: Establish - College of Law and Religion offering the JUD, as a degree program. The purpose of the program is to monetize critical thinking skills, without having to go to a ABA accredited law school or passing a state bar exam. Therefore, a consultant gets to set a fee schedule just like a lawyer.
- Step 3: Train enough ministry leaders in canon and civil law, so that, the non-affluent and non-criminal churchgoer maybe served by someone they know and who really cares.
